RECENT DONATION

The Centre Pompidou Foundation is delighted to announce Marc Benda's generous donation of a Nendo Cabbage Chair.

The Cabbage Chair was initially designed for the 2008 Tokyo exhibition, XXI Century Man, curated by Issey Miyake. Made of pleated paper produced during the process of making Miyake's signature pleated fabric (usually abandoned as an unwanted by-product), the chair has no internal structure and takes shape as a roll of the paper is cut vertically halfway down one side; so that the layers may be peeled back one at a time.

FROM THE CPF LETTERBOX

Recently, Edgar Arceneaux, whose work was acquired this June by the Centre Pompidou Foundation, sent us the following note about his work. His words give a thoughtful, more personal insight into the universal themes that his work addresses:

I began traveling to Europe from my home city of Los Angeles in 1998-99 in my mid 20's. As I travelled by train, staring out the window, I remember being struck by a powerful realization. The distances that I perceived to be so great between the world famous cities of Europe, Berlin, Rome, Venice, Paris, to be illusions that faded on each border that I crossed. The distance between the cities was intimate and I too was now intimate with these diversities of culture. When I arrived in Paris, I went to find the Pompidou and its famed architecture and since then have returned many times. Some of the best and most memorable shows I have ever seen have been at the Centre Pompidou. One of them was the Jean Cocteau retrospective exhibition, where the expanse of his work, the shifts in style and modes of working over the decades of his career left a lasting impression on me. It wasn't until I saw this exhibition that I realized how I too, a person of many temperaments and modes of working, was part of a great and historic tradition.

The work of mine in your collection is based on the Civil Unrest that has historically existed in the US since its birth as a nation. This drawing in particular focuses on the city of Detroit, a place that is paradoxically both of the future and frozen in the past. It's an important conversation to have in Paris as all cities must figure out how to remain humane environments in an increasingly technological and automated global world. Art plays a central role in that, I believe. Being part of the Pompidou collection is an honor, and as a distant relative of French ancestry, I feel a bit like a part of me is at home. I am grateful to the Acquisitions Committee, the CPF Board, the Centre Pompidou and Catherine David for bringing my work and ideas to France. It means the world to me.
